EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Cancer Connect began in April 2011, a transport service initially delivered by Local Link Cork. Local demand in West Cork indicated the need for transport to cancer treatments in Cork Hospitals. Consultation with CUH, MUH and South Infirmary confirmed the great need of bespoke transport for cancer patients; Local Link Cork purchased an 8-seater and the community gathered a team of volunteers to drive the vehicle to CUH for radiotherapy treatment. Cancer Connect was born; and began operating as a CLG in 2021.

It soon became apparent that the passengers attending radiotherapy treatment needed additional transport to meet Consultants, attend chemotherapy, have scans, procedures etc. Further Volunteers joined the panel and used their own cars.

Demand for the service grew quickly and substantially and a second radiotherapy route was established along the Castletownbere/Bantry line in October of the same year. By 2016 the service was expanded to cover North Cork. By the end of 2020, Cancer Connect was available throughout East Cork, becoming County wide cancer transport service.

The allocated staff of one member grew to two, then three in 2022. A Staff contingent of 3 allowed the company to allocate two staff to day-to-day bookings and passenger support, and the third to focus on fundraising, marketing, and management of the service.

Volunteers are the backbone of the transport service; there are 386 registered Drivers on the panel. From the Board of Management to the community members and organisations that fundraise and promote Cancer Connect, to the daily drives to and from Cork by the kind, reliable and outstanding team of drivers. Each member has played a role in ensuring the efficient transport service is continuous, local, free and reliable.

By December 2023 over 50,000 passenger journeys have been recorded.

MANAGER'S REVIEW

Welcome to our second annual report as a Company Limited by Guarantee. This year was busy for the company, with great progress made in governance, fundraising and above all, service delivery.

In 2023, new members joined the Board, to make an executive panel of 11 members, 4 Female and 7 Male. The skill and enthusiasm that the new members have brought has been evident, and there is a new energy at Board level. This has been reflected in discussion, decision making and development of the service. I would like to thank our original Board members for the hard work they have contributed to date and welcome our new additions. Cancer Connect needs a balance between governance and management to deliver quality transport to the community, I feel that balance is excellent and evident in the years work.

2023 saw substantial increase in funds raised by the Community for Cancer Connect. As the service develops, so too do associated overheads. 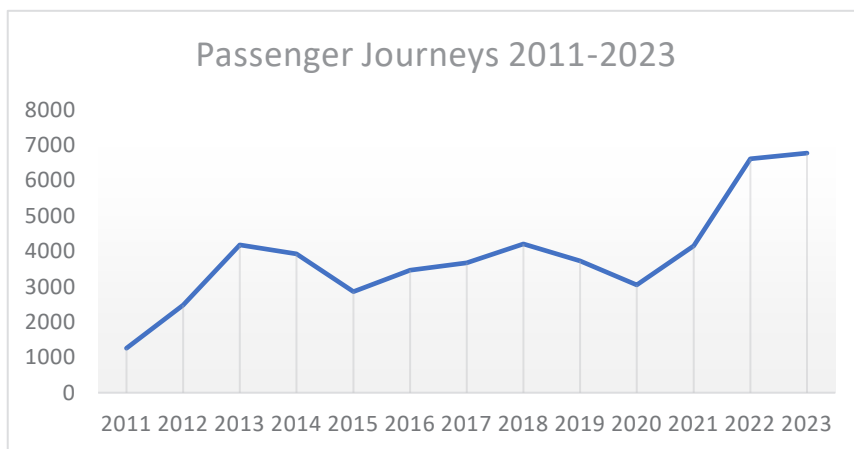
CANCER CONNECT 2023: A Year in Review

PASSENGER JOURNEYS

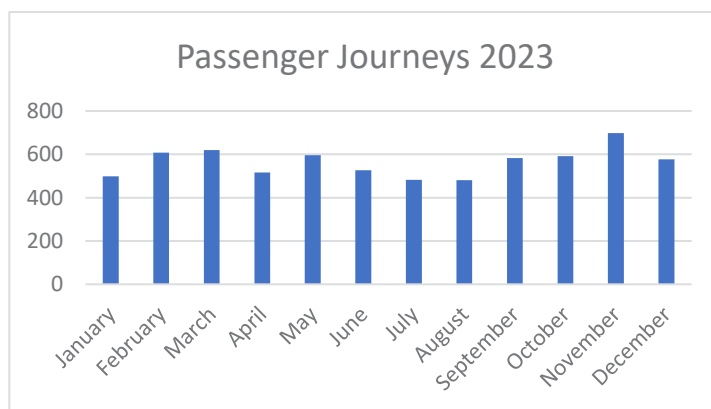
2023 saw a slight increase in the number of passenger journeys* recorded from the previous year. 2022 had seen a significant growth in passenger journeys of 59%, 2023 saw an increase of just 2.5%. In total, 6,774 passenger journeys were recorded by year end.

Three hundred and fifteen individual Passengers used the service throughout the year, many more than once. The passenger with the highest transport need recorded 120 journeys. It is noteworthy to mention that this passenger lives over 2 hours from Cork city, so the transport required was significant, as was the impact of its availability.

The busiest month in 2023 was November, with just under 700 passenger journeys recorded.



Left: Passenger journeys recorded since the service began. By 2023 - year end, 50,300+ journeys had been recorded throughout the County.



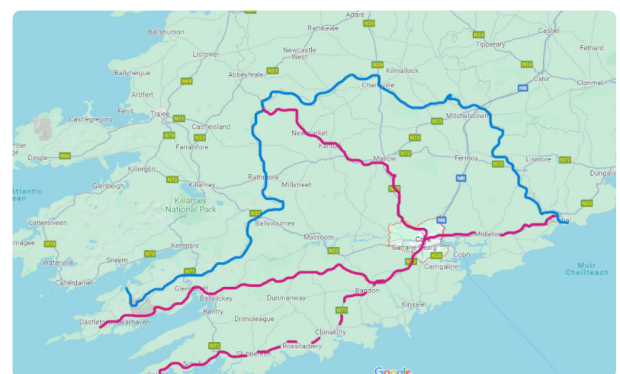

BY AREA

When reviewing types of service use, 'Radiotherapy' represents all passengers attending daily radium treatment in CUH and Bon Secours Hospital.

'Chemotherapy' represents chemo treatment plus any cancer related appointment such as consultant visits, scans, blood tests, wig clinics etc.

When reviewing the journeys by area; radiotherapy routes are highlighted in pink. These pink lines represent the route that the radiotherapy service

travels. If unable to meet along the route, Passengers are collected from home. Chemotherapy Passengers are always collected at home, and brought to hospital on a one to one basis. All trip data is collected as closest to route i.e. for Passengers collected in the West (Castletownbere), represent a wide region of pick ups from Castletownbere, Allihies, Bantry, Dunmanway, Enniskeane etc.

West Cork (Goleen and Castletownbere) accounted for over 70% of all transport, with East Cork recording 18% of passenger journeys and North Cork only 11% of passenger journeys.

Chemotherapy journeys were busier in 3 areas, however in East Cork it was radiotherapy that accounted for a more significant number of journeys. What is important to note here is that the chemo journeys are almost always delivered on a one to one basis. Radiotherapy transport in West (Goleen & Castletownbere) and East took place in an 8 seater – where the ratio of Driver to Passenger can be up to 1:8. The more chemotherapy journeys delivered, the more drivers, logistics, cost and communication required.

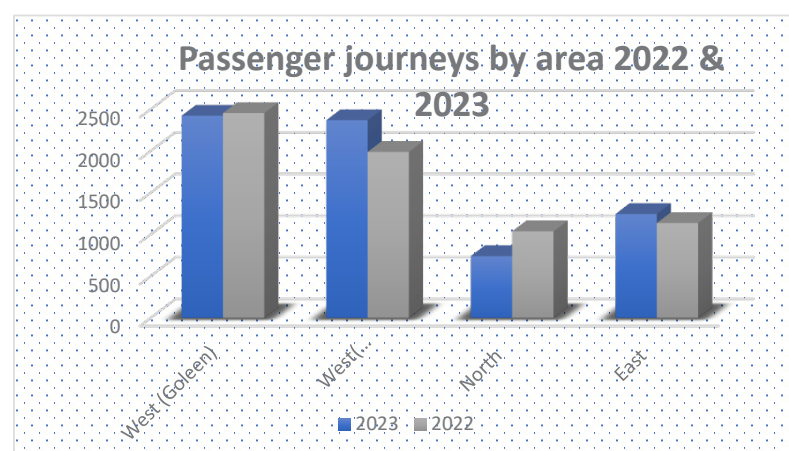
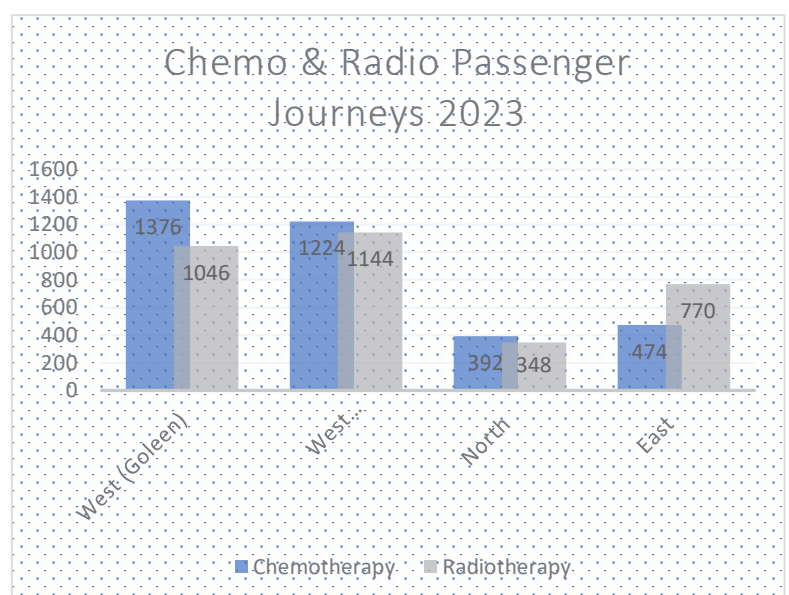
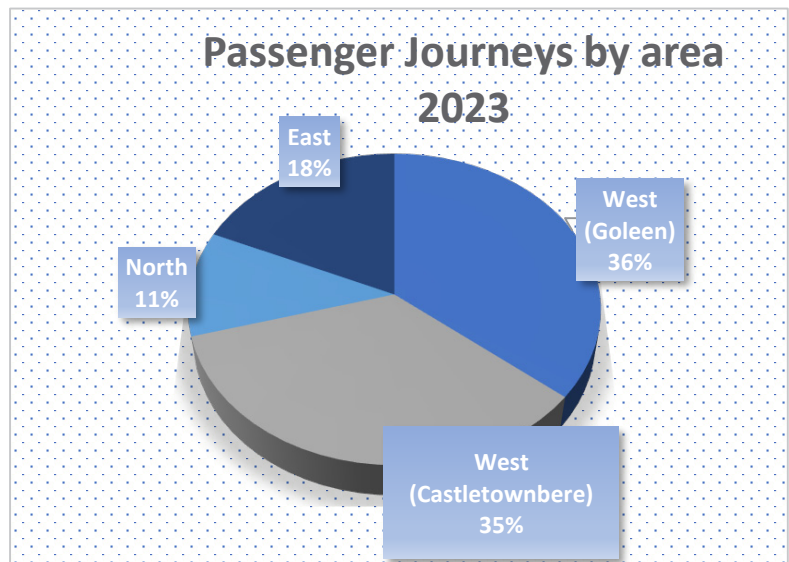
A decrease in service usage in the North, and generally lower take up of transport, was highlighted at frequent Board meetings, and resulted in 2 new vehicles purchased for the area. The 2 Western Routes remain busiest, perhaps because the service commenced in the region in 2011, or that distance is a greater obstacle in the area. The chemotherapy service travelling through Skibbereen and Clonakilty along the N71 was the busiest route in 2023.

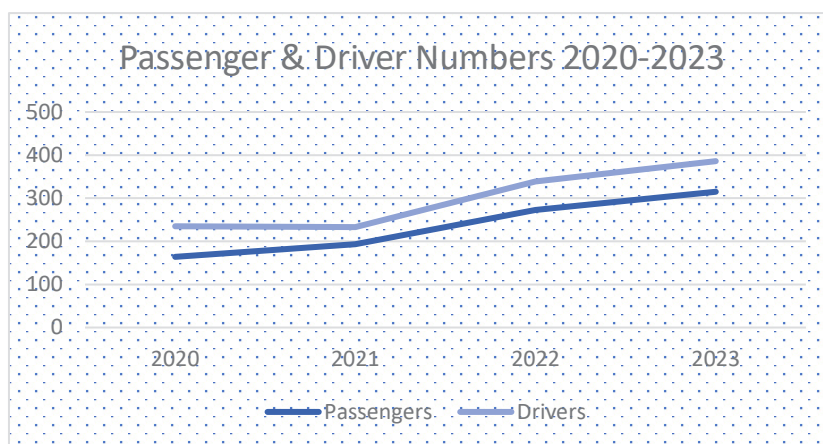
There was, as mentioned, only a 2.5% difference in journeys recorded between 2022 and 2023. North Cork saw less transport, while demand transport rose in East Cork

November 2023 saw the highest number of journeys per month that year. The 698 passenger journeys required 218 individual Drivers to meet the transport demand. One hundred individual passengers used the service that month.

Cancer Connect has seen steady growth in transport demand since the service began in 2011. However, there has been a marked rise in service use since 2020. Passenger journeys increased by 122% from 2020 to 2023. The level of voluntary Drivers available has ultimately risen accordingly.

DRIVERS

The Year 2023 saw 386 Volunteers drive for Cancer Connect, representing an increase of 14% on the year before. The increase in the panel also brought about an increase in geographical coverage, a recruitment drive for East Cork brought in many new drivers from the Youghal, Midleton and city suburbs which eased responding to demand in the region.

Pre Covid, there were two types of roster in action. There were panels of Radiotherapy drivers for the 2 Western Routes. There was also a chemo panel which included drivers from each area, scheduled monthly for the year. This rostering made logistics easier in-house. With the onset of Covid, many Drivers removed themselves from the panel, and the rostered collapsed.

In 2023, Cancer Connect panel was finally comprehensive enough to again allow for rostering. By the end of the year, each Driver was scheduled monthly for a year ahead. Specific dates meant for a much more efficient booking process for everyone involved. This system was introduced to Drivers at various meetings in Youghal, Mallow, Bantry and Clonakilty. The meetings included an overview of Cancer Connect activities and addressed the funding needs of the service. Over 200 Drivers attended, and the engagement was invaluable. Drivers met their colleagues, exchanged ideas, discussed challenges and most importantly got to know their team.

TALKING ABOUT CANCER

In November 2022, Cancer Connect, in conjunction with Cork ARC Cancer Support, and with the support of The Irish Hospice Foundation, invited Drivers to a session called 'Talking About Cancer'. Drivers had vocalised struggles when dealing with bereavement and loss, dealing with the emotional aspect of their Passengers' cancer journey. Successful sessions took place in Clonakilty and Cork City in 2023. Driver care is paramount; the session was developed to ensure that the emotional weight of dealing with cancer does not become overbearing. Drivers focussed on mindfulness, active listening and coping with grief.

VEHICLES

The Cancer Connect fleet increased in 2023. Since 2020, the service had use of a car in Kanturk kindly provided (at no cost) by Dan Twomey. This vehicle proved invaluable and was used by many of the local drivers for chemotherapy transport. It was decided that Cancer Connect

would purchase both an 8 seater and a car for the North Cork area. The reasoning was three fold; demand for radiotherapy qualified the purchase, the community had increased fundraising initiatives to support the cost and thirdly it was deemed strategic in the development of North Cork transport. An application was made for Clár funding, which was successful. €50,000 was granted toward purchase of an 8 seater. An application was also made to Lotto Funding, of which €6,000 was granted. This was put towards the cost of a car, dedicated to chemotherapy transport for the region.

The radiotherapy 8 seater based in Skibbereen was upgraded to a 191 Hyundai Montana. Cancer Connect now owns 8 vehicles; 4 cars and 4 8-seaters strategically placed around the County. This means that there is an 8-seater dedicated to each radiotherapy route. 1 Driver to 8 passengers is more practical logistically and also allows for more peer support of Passengers.

FINANCES

Much to the disappointment of The Cancer Connect Board & Staff, there was no allocation of funds from the Government under The National Cancer Control Programme in 2023. This meant a continued full reliance on the community and on grants available through HSE.

Events held and donations contributed to Cancer Connect surpassed previous years; 2023 saw an increase in individual and community organisations fundraising for the service. This allowed the Company to begin to build reserves, allowing the company capacity to fund working capital, unexpected expenditure, and future shortfalls in income and to accumulate funds for any major projects or events. A Reserve of €250,000 was agreed at Board level, and while this was not fully realised in 2023, the community funds raised allowed this process to begin.

There were 318 donations made to Cancer Connect throughout the year. Finances were raised at Threshings, Charity Shops, Walks, Raffles, and many more. Some of the larger amounts were donated by The Galley Head Swim, Clonakilty Golf Classic, Aughadown Cancer Connect Fundraiser, Danny Collins Mayors Ball, Paddy McQueen Fundraising, Broderick Family & Friends, Maud's Miles Charity Walk, Cullinane's of Lyre and Jerh Stack Memorial Committee. Vince Power, a Castletownbere Passenger and firm ally of Cancer Connect, raised over €16,600. An application was made to the Hospital Saturday Fund, and Cancer Connect was granted €13,500.

The HSE granted €20,000 through Section 39 funding to support a staff member, €6,000 through Lotto funding towards the cost of a vehicle in North Cork and additionally offered once off funding of €50,000 at the end of the year.

STAFFING

Cancer Connect had a change of personnel in 2023. Julie Harrington finished working with the Company in April and was replaced by Sinead Keohane. Sinead and Karen O'Connor focussed on the day-to-day transport scheduling, with Karen having the additional responsibility of financial administration. Helen O'Driscoll was employed formally as Manager. At this point, there was no more staff seconded from Local Link Cork and Cork Cancer Connect CLG became an employer of 3 part time staff.

A CE position was granted to Cancer Connect in 2023, allowing for a position of Office Assistant to be supported. Deirdre Nugent started with Cancer Connect in September; this alleviated the administrative workload greatly. Jane De La Cour continued to volunteer in the office for a half day per week, concentrating on Driver inductions and fundraising. This brought the personnel contingent to 5. It was agreed that Cancer Connect had outgrown the available space in the Local Link Cork office. A new premises was located on the same street, and the company expects to move in early 2024. Relations with Local link Cork are set to remain strong.

BOARD DEVELOPMENT

The Board of 6 members in 2023 met 6 times throughout the year for general meetings and held its first AGM as a trading CLG in September 2023. It was agreed to both add to and diversify the Board Membership, and 5 new members were invited to join the Board in December 2023. The Board is made up of 4 women and 7 men. These members will formally become Directors in 2024.



THE WORK OF THE ORGANISATION

Voluntary Board - Governance

Cancer Connect is governed by a Voluntary Board of Directors. This Board has responsibility to oversee the work of the Organisation. The Members direct operations and ensure all work is done safely and correctly. They put controls in place, and review operational and financial activity on a regular basis. The Board is ultimately accountable for the legal, regulatory, and financial conditions of the company and the realisation of a long term vision.

Staff - Management

The Staff team are responsible for co-ordinating the work of the organisation. Maintaining a driving panel involves regular recruitment of and engagement with each volunteer, and then rostering drivers on a monthly (or often more frequently) basis.

The Staff dedicate much time to Passenger support, ensuring flexibility and meeting individual needs while arranging transport to and from appointments. The Staff liaise with Hospitals, manage administration, promote the service, engaging with fundraising events, apply for grants and ultimately report to the Board of Directors.

Voluntary Drivers & Fundraisers - Operations

Volunteer Drivers are tasked with collecting passengers from home or scheduled pick-up point. Each Driver brings their Passenger to the door of the hospital, waits in Cork, and brings them home once the appointment is completed. While the role is solely driving, Volunteers offer much more in terms of comfort and support. Income is derived from fundraisers who organise a range of events across the county. This onerous job can range from organising a head shave to developing and selling a calendar, generating revenue for the service.

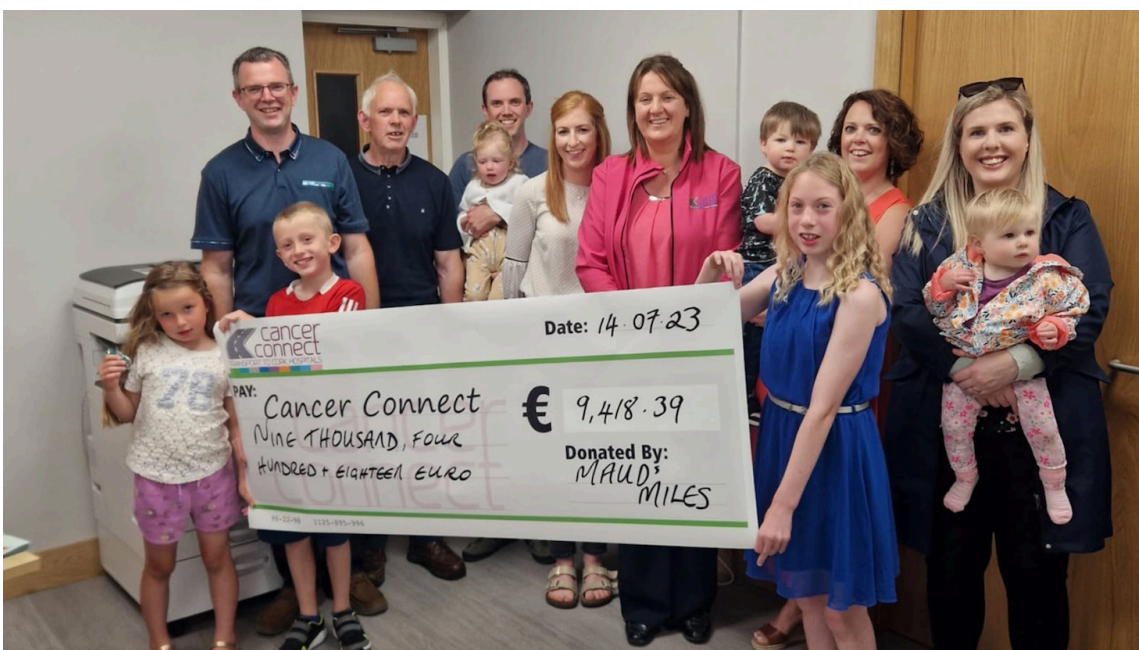
It's that time of year again when normally we would give various gifts to our customers. As this year has been yet again a trying year for many families, we have decided to change and instead make a generous donation to your organisation.
